A Leap Forward In Local Food Waste Recycling

Even before food waste recycling became law under Senate Bill 1383, E.J. Harrison & Sons was focusing on the future with a pilot recycling program for commercial customers. From there, our food waste recycling programs have evolved with the help of our partners at Agromin and Gold Coast Recycling. More and more of you have successfully joined our efforts to keep food waste out of landfills.

And now, we've taken another huge leap forward. Local recycling capabilities recently expanded dramatically thanks to the long-awaited opening of our partner Agromin's Mountain View Food Waste Processing Facility in Oxnard.

The plant, which brings much-needed efficiencies to local food waste recycling, is currently capable of handling 300 tons of food waste a day, keeping the food waste out of landfills and turning it into eco-friendly products.

Agromin spent several years and \$15 million working with us and local officials to launch the new facility. It's the latest and largest step forward in the efforts of Harrison Industries and our partners to keep us at the forefront of recycling technology and environmental stewardship.

"We started the process in 2017. We leased the property and started the permitting process, and finally, here we are eight years later," said Agromin CEO Bill Camarillo.

Your holiday gift-giving list likely includes family members, friends, co-workers and maybe even your local mail carrier, dog-walker, gardener or other service provider. But if you feel like you've forgotten one recipient, maybe try this one: our planet.

That's right, Mother Earth is a deserving addition to your gift list. By recycling all of the food waste created in your kitchen, you help rescue the planet from the harmful effects of climate change. This is especially important around the holidays.

Statistics show Americans throw away at least 25% more trash between Thanksgiving and New Year's Day. And with large family meals, parties and other holiday celebrations, food waste is a big part of that increase.

If it's not recycled, that extra food waste ends up in landfills, where it creates destructive methane gas, which in turn contributes to many of the natural disasters we all read about. Methane is a nasty climate change catalyst, a so-called "super pollutant" that is 84% more potent than carbon dioxide when it comes to global warming. Recycling your food waste is a great gift that helps protect the planet. And it's a gift that keeps on giving as your food waste is turned into green products that help create beautiful gardens of fresh vegetables and beautiful flowers.

So if you haven't started food waste recycling, or maybe you just do it once in a while, now is a great opportunity to get in the holiday spirit with your gift to Mother Earth. Double Trash Weeks Ahead

This year, we will again pick up twice the usual amount of residential customers' trash, at no extra cost, during the two weeks after Christmas. On your pickup days between Friday, Dec. 26, and Monday, Jan. 12, you can place bags of extra trash alongside your waste cart at the curb.

Please make sure to put the extra trash in bags. You can also put out extra recyclables next to your blue cart, but please be sure to flatten all boxes.

Recycle Your Christmas Tree

After providing some Christmas spirit during holiday celebrations, your Christmas tree can keep on giving after you've removed it.

We're again providing Christmas tree recycling for our residential customers this year, and we encourage you to participate in this important effort.

Recycling your tree truly is a holiday gift to Mother Earth. Instead of giving off climate-damaging methane gas in a landfill, your tree is processed into mulch by our partner Agromin, which benefits our farmlands, orchards, nurseries and home gardens.

During the two weeks after Christmas – from Dec. 26 through Jan. 12 – simply remove everything, including ornaments, tinsel and other items you put on the tree. Then cut the tree into 4-foot sections and put them in your organics/yard waste cart. (This is the preferred method, which we highly encourage.)

Otherwise, place the whole Christmas tree at the curb on collection day. (Flocked trees are accepted.)

We appreciate your help, and thanks also to Agromin and our local municipalities for participating in this program.

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to the Simi Valley landfill, where it was manually processed, decontaminated, mixed with mulch made from green waste, and sent to Kern County for composting. Residential food waste was taken to our partners at Gold Coast Recycling for separation.

All commercial and residential food waste Harrison collects will now end up at the Mountain View facility.

Bill Camarillo explained the new automated process. "There's a lot of food waste generated in the commercial sector, so all of that material today is being collected and it has contamination like plastic bags, knives, forks, spoons, glass bottles, things that are all nonfood material. Once the food waste is loaded into the hoppers, it never touches the ground again and it has no personnel manually processing it like we were doing. This machine shreds the material, presses it like a big press to squeeze the food out of the material, and then runs that food over really fine screens with water to remove any final pieces of glass, metal or plastic. We end up with this baby food-like material that's completely clean that we can make four different things out of such as renewable natural gas, organic fertilizers, animal feed and compost."

Composting and dehydrating happens elsewhere, but Agromin is working on producing organic fertilizer on the premises.

Agromin is also in the process of expanding its Limoneira Ranch green waste composting facility in Santa Paula. The Limoneira expansion is expected to be completed in 2026.

"Once Limoneira's expansion is open, it will be able to accept all the food waste for composting. It will be a commercial site whereas now it's an agricultural site," Camarillo said.



A Green Holiday is a Happy Holiday

The holidays are upon us once more and there's always lots to think about. But something else to keep in mind is reducing holiday waste. Elsewhere in this newsletter we discussed the importance of recycling food waste that comes along with holiday meals, celebrations and family gatherings. But there are other things you can do to keep your holidays green.

It's no surprise that Americans throw away at least 25 percent more trash than usual from Thanksgiving to New Year's Day, according to some estimates. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has a list of steps you can take to help decrease that waste.

🌲 Think green before you shop holiday sales. Bring your own reusable cloth bag for carrying your purchases, and try to buy items with minimal packaging and/or made with recycled content.

🍷 If you host a party, set the table with cloth napkins and reusable dishes, glasses, and silverware. Also save and reuse party hats, decorations, and favors.

🌿 Be sure your guests know where to properly dispose of and recycle their wastes at your party. And make sure you have an area for food waste. You can also put leftovers in recyclable containers and share them with family, friends, or others. Donate untouched leftovers from parties to a local food bank or homeless shelter.

📦 Wrap gifts in recycled or reused wrapping paper. Also remember to save or recycle your used wrapping paper. Give gifts that don't require much packaging, such as concert tickets or gift certificates.

🍪 Give homemade cookies or other goodies as gifts, using reusable containers.

Sort Your Waste and Recyclables Correctly!

When disposing of trash, do the right thing and sort it correctly! Placing recyclables in the trash (or vice versa) slows sorting and reduces recycling efficiency. Keeping waste in the right cart ensures more materials get recycled.

Why it matters: Doing your part helps save the environment:

- ◆ Recyclables in the wrong cart can end up in landfills instead of being reused.
- ◆ Organic waste (food and yard waste) belongs in the organics cart. If sent to a landfill, it decomposes and releases methane, a powerful greenhouse gas that contributes to climate change.

Follow these simple guidelines:

- ◆ Recyclables go in the **blue** cart.
- ◆ Yard waste and bagged food waste go in the **green** organics cart (or **tan**, until a new green cart is delivered).
- ◆ All other trash goes in the **black** cart (or **green**, until a new black cart is delivered).
